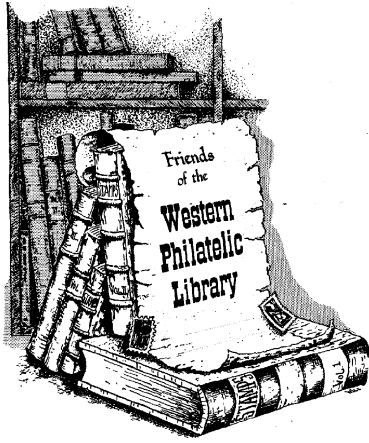

WPL doings and volunteer help needed

Periodicals With Lois

Lois handles all the incoming periodicals, checking the inventory cards to see if they are needed and if so updating the card. She could use some help in just putting the periodical in their respective box until ready to prepare for binding. It's an easy task, but does require some dexterity to find the proper place to put the periodical, coping with the alphabetical sequence then often climbing the ladder to get it there. When a new box needs to be added, then there is some shuffling boxes around to make sure they stay in sequence so they can be found for the next search. New inventory cards need to be made up when a new title is encountered so the ability to type (hunt & peck is OK it's only a couple of words) is also a big asset. Care to help? Lois is there every Tuesday from 1 to 3 PM, so drop by and see what you can do! There is enough that you can choose your own time once you know the routine.

Jack and the Beanstalk

Jack is attempting to put the bound journals in their proper sequence on some added shelving which is not an impossible task, but it does involve a lot of up and down work so you may think you are climbing into the sky by the end of the day. The job entails first sorting in proper alphabetical order, then considering the size and matching it to the shelves available and doing whatever adjusting is necessary to make it all fit together. It certainly is a lot easier to do with two people especially when you have to stand on a step stool to place the book on the shelf. Just fetching the "next" journal is a challenge as with our successful binding program, we are simply loaded with titles tucked all over the place. Jack is also keeping a list of the titles which we hope to publish in the Bay Phil when the task is finished. Jack also works on Tuesday from 1 Pm to 3 PM, but could use some help on any day you might have available.

Pamphlets with Don

Don McKinstry is doing his best to enter each new pamphlet in the library computer inventory file, but the rest of us keep piling more new items on top of old. Our files have a numerical sequence to them but some subject files are so big we have the split them alphabetically and provide new hanging folders. Not a difficult task, but a demanding one in trying to keep each pamphlet in the right order, identified and in a decent condition. Don could use some help, and any assistance that could be given to make up file labels, here or at home, would be much appreciated. There are other organizing things to do, such as putting pamphlets in a safe enclosure when needed, identifying any packages used and reconciling the electronic file with the actual file are basic needs. If you would like to help, Don works Friday mornings from 10 to noon, even when it is cold! Two or more would help heat up the library!

15th Edition of *Scott Errors Catalogue*

Scott Catalogue of Errors on U.S. Postage Stamps 15th Edition by Stephen R. Datz. Scott Publishing Co, Sidney, Ohio, 2009. Softbound, 6x9 inch, 232pp., illus.

The revised and expanded *Scott Catalogue of Errors on U.S. Postage Stamps 15th Edition* by Stephen R. Datz was released in November, much to the delight of U.S. errors specialists. The catalog is the authoritative guide to United States error stamps written by one of the country's leading error experts.

This reference work opens with a useful introduction that defines the relevant terminology used by EFO (Errors, Freaks and Oddities) collectors and provides instructions for how to use the catalog.

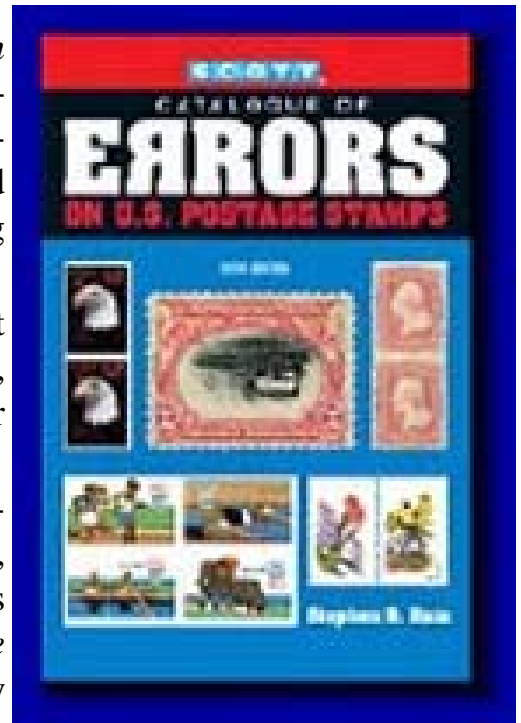
The errors are then divided into the main categories of imperforates, color-omitted errors, hologram-omitted errors, back inscription errors, inverts, printer's waste, and freaks and oddities. Each error is identified by *Scott Catalogue* number and is illustrated, along with a value and the quantity known. More than 400 useful footnotes amplify the listings.

The new edition features more than 100 new listings, including some older items that were recently documented. Also included for the first time are separate listings for modern proofs from the American Bank Note archives. They appear in an Error-Like Imperforates section with other imperforates that resemble error stamps, but are not.

The 14th edition was published in 2005 with 216 pages. Both editions are in color but the new edition has consistently darker images, apparently due to a change in paper stock. Many of the 2006 images appeared washed out and most of the new edition images offer more realistic colors, although some are overly dark. The 15th edition also replaced some of the still black and white images so that only some of the rarer errors remain in black and white.

Based on the catalog values, the error market has seen mixed results in recent years. The values for rarities, such as the Jenny (Scott C3a) airmail inverts and the 1869 inverts, have soared but the values of many common modern errors are flat or have declined.

One other thing that has risen is the price of the *Errors* catalog. The 14th edition retailed for \$24.99; the 15th edition is \$49.99. Despite the steep increase, the Datz *Errors* catalog remains the only one-stop resource for error collectors and dealers and is highly recommended for anyone interested in this specialty.

Understanding Transatlantic Mail Volume 2

Understanding Transatlantic Mail Volume 2 by Richard F. Winter. American Philatelic Society, Bellefonte, Pa., 2009. Hardbound with dust jacket, 8.5 x 11 inch, 600pp., illus.

The wildly popular *Understanding Transatlantic Mail Volume 1*, published by the American Philatelic Society in 2006, has now been supplemented by *Understanding Transatlantic Mail Volume 2*, which expands the coverage of the original volume. *Volume 1* covered Bremen, British, Prussian and French mail; *Volume 2* covers Hamburg, Belgium, Netherlands, North German Union and Switzerland mail.

An understanding of transatlantic covers eludes many collectors because the field is complicated due to the fees on letters that were determined by bilateral postal agreements between the United States and foreign governments. These agreements changed often.

Dick Winter, a subject matter expert, has continued his excellent research and has made valuable strides in making this complex postal history area understandable for the average collector and specialist alike.

After a thorough 14-page introduction, the book jumps into each chapter, providing in-depth reviews of pre-postal conventions, postal conventions, contract and non-contract steamship and ship mail, and postal rates.

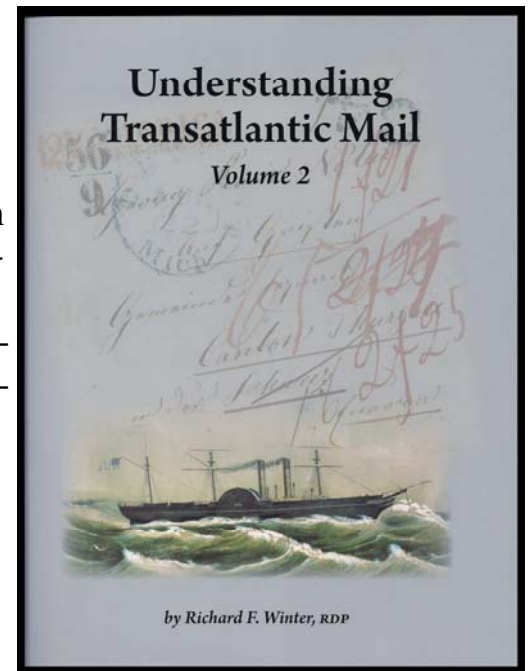
Winter's well-researched tome provides detailed explanations of the related covers and their markings, while providing the needed background about conventions, ship routes and mail rates for the 1840-1875 period.

Two handy appendixes examine U.S. exchange offices by convention date and manuscript rate markings for five countries.

A detailed bibliography and a particularly helpful index complete the work. As an added bonus, attached to the inside back cover is a CD of selected full color illustrations of items in the book.

Volume 2 is arranged in an easy to follow two-column format with ample footnotes throughout. The page numbering is continuous with *Volume 1* and starts on page 483 with the new volume. The black and white illustrations are of high quality and support each chapter.

The *Volume 1* printing of 1,200 copies sold out in nine months. I expect that *Volume 2* will be equally well received as a superb work and an essential reference.

BY -LAWS

ARTICLE I - Name and Purpose

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be The Friends of the Western Philatelic Library, Inc., hereafter the FWPL, a nonprofit corporation under the laws of California.

Section 2. The purposes of the Friends of the Western Philatelic Library are:

- To provide a repository for philatelic literature and its preservation, slide and/or video programs, and related items for the use by philatelists for information, study, education and research.
- To encourage the study of philately in general and provide for basic instruction of philately and/or advanced specialized education and research.
- To act as an information center for philatelists.

ARTICLE II - Membership

Section 1. Any applicant interested in promoting the purpose of the FWPL, presenting satisfactory references, and in good standing with other philatelic organizations, is eligible for membership.

Section 2. The right to hold office, to vote and to participate in the business affairs of the FWPL shall be vested only in members in good standing. A member in good standing is one who is not in default payment of any financial obligation to the FWPL, against whom no censure or suspension is pending with the FWPL, or other philatelic organizations, and the Board has not declared the member to not be in good standing.

Section 3. Applications for membership in the FWPL shall be reviewed by the Board of Directors on a timely basis. If the Board determines that membership in the FWPL is not in its best interest, the application for membership shall be returned to the applicant, along with any moneys proffered for membership dues, with or without comment. Any applicant who has had an application returned may appear before the Board to plead his/her case for membership. The decision for acceptance or rejection remains with the Board and the decision of the Board is final. The Board may choose to reopen a membership decision, at its discretion.

ARTICLE III - Elections

Section 1. Elective offices of the FWPL shall be held by the members of the Board of Directors, and shall include a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer chosen from their ranks. Additionally, at the discretion of the Board, members may be chosen to hold the title of Director Emeritus.

Section 2. Four months before the expiration of the term of office of the Board members, the Chairman shall recommend to the Board a Nominating Committee of three from among the membership of the FWPL. Three months before the general election, the Nominating Committee shall submit a list of candidates from among the FWPL membership for the Board membership for the ensuing term. The list of candidates shall be posted at the general offices of the FWPL and the Secretary shall prepare or cause to be prepared a ballot to be submitted to the membership of the FWPL at least one month prior to the date of expiration of the end of the term of office of the seated Board member.

Section 3. The election to the Board of Directors shall be for a six (6) year term commencing one month after their election and shall be determined by written ballot of the members of the FWPL.

ARTICLE IV - Board of Directors

Section 1. The authority to conduct the business of the FWPL as defined in Section 4, shall be vested in the Board of Directors, also referred to as the Board.

Section 2. The Board shall have the power to fill vacancies in the Board for an unexpired term

Section 3. The total membership of the Board shall consist of nine (9) members. The election of Board members shall be on a rotating basis with one-third (1/3) being elected every two (2) years.

Section 4. In addition to the general powers conferred upon the FWPL by the laws of the State of California by virtue of its articles of Incorporation, the Board may take and hold property, real and personal, by gift, grant, devise, bequest or in trust for the furtherance of the FWPL's purposes, may use, buy, sell, let or dispose of its property as it shall deem best for the interest of the FWPL; may open bank accounts and engage in the necessary financial transactions required for the furtherance of the purposes of the FWPL.

Section 5. Meetings of the Board shall be open to all members and held at such time and place as may be designated by the Chairman of the Board, and must meet at least four times a year, one of which shall be designated as the annual meeting, which shall be the January Board of Directors meeting. Emergency meetings of the Board may be called by one-third of the Board members.

Section 6. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of Board Meetings to conduct FWPL business in person or via telecommunications. Actions of the Board are decided by a majority of Board Members present at a Board Meeting. Members of the Board shall not authorize another person or persons to act in their behalf by proxy.

Section 7. At the Board's discretion, any board member who misses three consecutive meetings may be removed from the board.

ARTICLE V - Duties of the Board

Section 1. The Chairman of the Board of Directors is the Chief Executive Officer of the FWPL and shall be responsible for conducting meetings of the Board. The Chairman may request a report from each member present on current matters within their respective areas of responsibility and provide an opportunity for Board discussion and Board action as necessary. The Board is responsible for the making of general policy for the FWPL.

Section 2. The Chairman shall appoint chairpersons to appoint a committee approved by the Board from the general membership and/or members of the Board for carrying out the purposes of the FWPL. The Board shall have the power to remove a committee chairperson and/or vacate a committee.

Section 3. In the absence of the Chairman or in the event of the Chairman's inability to act, the Vice Chairman shall perform the duties of and be subject to all the restrictions of the Chairman. The Vice Chairman, and the other board members shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned by the Chairman of the Board subject to the limitations in Article V.

Section 4. The Secretary shall record and distribute the minutes of the Board meetings.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all monies of the FWPL authorized by the Board, and shall have custody of all securities belonging to the FWPL. The Treasurer shall make or cause to be made a detailed annual financial statement of the Board, which shall be subject to an audit by a committee appointed for this purpose or by a recognized public accountant.

Section 6. The Board shall appoint various members to oversee general daily operations, schedule volunteers, receive and process incoming mail, dues and donations carry out all programs approved by the Board, implement approved budget programs and expenditures, and maintain liaison with the members of the FWPL and with other philatelic organizations on behalf of the FWPL, a proper register of the membership and preservation of the records, and the response to official correspondence.

Section 7. All members of the Board shall serve without compensation, and no monies or property shall inure to the benefit of any Board member. Reasonable expenses incurred by any member of the Board in performance of their duties shall be paid.

Section 8. Any member of the Board may be removed from office by a three-fourths vote of the Board.

ARTICLE VI - Dues

Section 1. The annual dues shall be such sum as may be set by the Board. The annual

dues amount shall be reviewed at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board may create additional categories of membership at additional costs, such as Life, Contributing, Sustaining, Patron and Benefactor, with additional benefits as it deems appropriate to the category.

Section 3. Members who do not pay dues within sixty (60) days after the end of the accounting year will be advised by mail that if their dues are not paid within thirty (30) days, their name will be removed from the membership register. Members shall be reinstated by payment of the dues for the current year.

ARTICLE VII - Amendment of the By-Laws

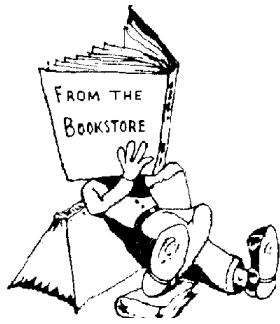
Section 1. The Board of Directors may propose amendments to the By-laws. Proposed amendments will be presented to the membership and adopted by a majority of the members voting.

ARTICLE VIII - Dissolution

Section 1. This corporation can be dissolved with a three-fourths majority decision by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall pay all debts, or adequately provide for the debts and obligations of the corporation. The remaining voting assets shall be distributed to non-profit philatelic societies, foundations, or corporations by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors.

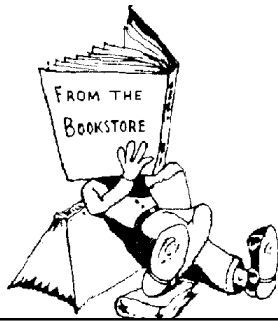

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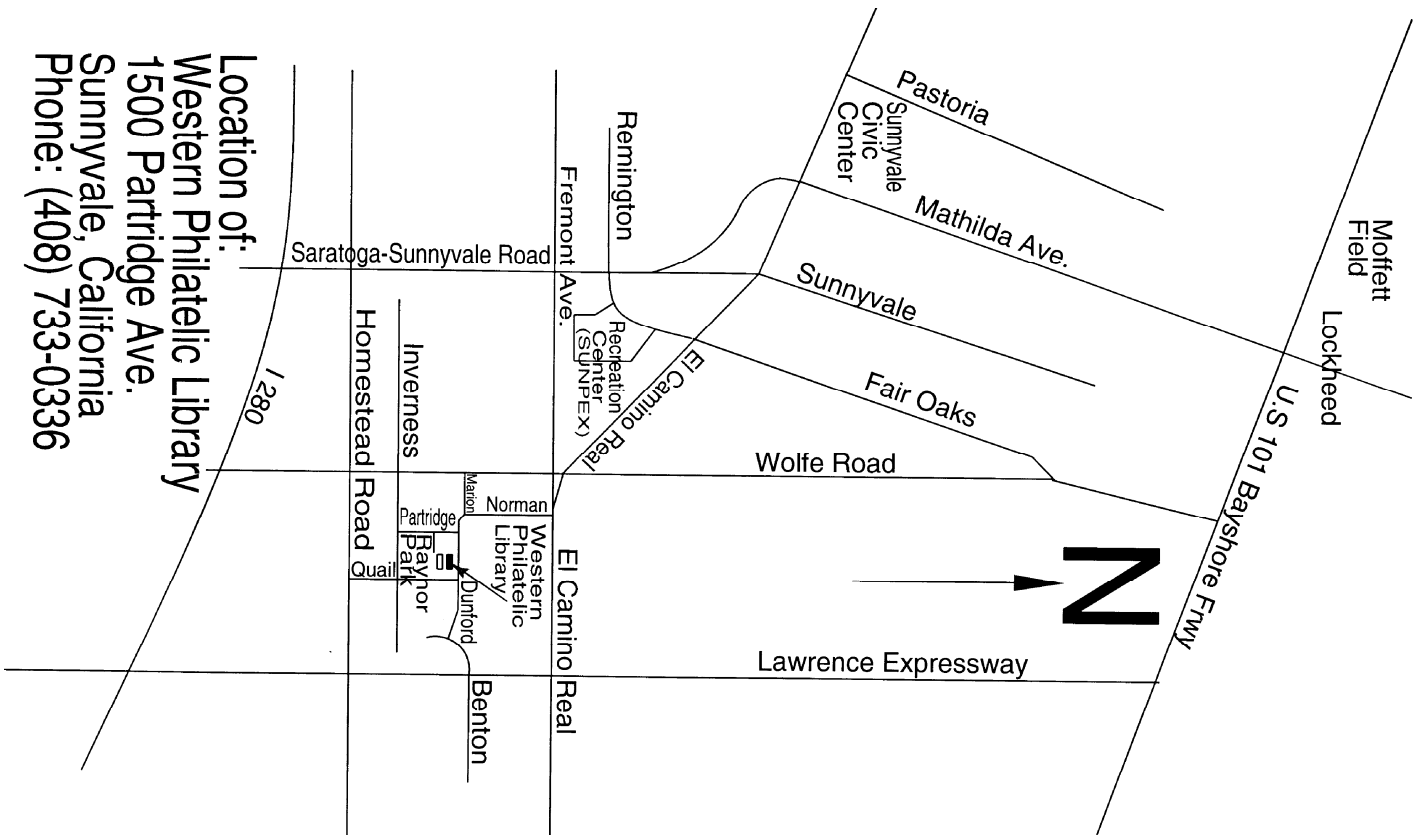
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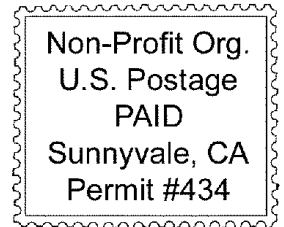
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
