It has always been our policy that material can be used in whole or in part by individuals or other non-profit organizations, provided credit is given to *The Bay Phil* and the individual authors of the reproduced material. A copy of the publication in which the material is printed is requested to be provided for our archives.

Potential library projects

- *) Journal Indices: Many journals have long term runs that are not indexed anywhere.. Some are short term runs that have not been indexed and need to be.
- *) Inventory reconciliation. Many items are "lost" and while found in a data base are not located on the shelves. The reverse is also true in that some items on the shelf do not have entries in the database. True for all files, Books, Pamphlets, Catalogs, Media, etc.
- *) Correction of ISBN listed books compared to data entries to insure consistency.
- *) Classification system of preferred terms to use in data entry of a specialized library, in this case a philatelic library.
- *) Topical subject index and Country Index: Needs to be updated and printed out.
- *) Improve existing volume /issue index file for journals into a subject oriented listing for publication by specific group.
- *) GPO files, need to arrange, make listing of governments represented, folder labels, etc.
- *) Society Files. Need hanging folder labels, File drawer labels, List of all societies updated.
- *) Exhibition Group Files. Need hanging folder labels, File drawer labels, List of all groups updated.
- *) Small Society/Precancel Auction Lists. Need hanging folder labels, File drawer labels, List of all groups made.
- *) Literature Sales. Need to update listing of books/pamphlets available. Sort items into proper locations. Sort through backlog of items to list.
- *) Bonus Books, Make up list of books to offer to donors and life members, each year.
- *) Historical file of members, address' be able to reconcile differences with mailing list.
- *) Duplicate journals, sort into chronological sequence and try to arrange on shelf.
- *) Auction Catalogues, Foreign. Sort into house order and try to identify locations.
- *) Auction Catalogs, make up auction lots from duplicate stock for e-bay sale.
- *) Donations. Sort after donation receipt made up & distribute, reconcile for duplications.
- *) Bay Phil: Articles about the library and its functions, or literature in general sorely needed. What is in library, who works in library and what they are doing.
- *) Bay Phil: Articles about what you find most useful in the library.
- *) Bay Phil: Articles about what new books have arrived in library.
- *) Bay Phil: Show booth operations need one volunteer to write up which shows W.P.L. will attend and other details.
- *) Show booth needs volunteers to operate during show hours and to stock material in off hours. WESTPEX, FILATELIC FIESTA, SACAPEX, etc are typical shows and others.
- *) Auction Catalogs: Assist Jerry Mix with US firms, arrange in chronological order, enter in computer files.
- *) Journals: Lois needs help in arranging plastic boxes on shelves. Lots of plastic boxes need to be cut down to fit on smaller shelves.
- *) Speaking at club meetings about library and how it can help collector.
- *) Investigate library improvements such as RFID vs Bar coding.
- *) Grant Proposals: Develop proposals for grants with details. Submit & follow up! For example a grant for San Jose State library intern to work at W.P.L.
- *) Hold workshops at library on various projects. Manage by finding volunteers, determining extent of work to be done in each session. Publicize your project, manage the session, arrange rewards for volunteers.
- *) Books: Prepare books for binding: certifying all pages intact.
- *) Protect books with book jackets. Keep inventory of materials used.
- *) Books: "Read Shelves", put in sequence.
- *) Pamphlet file cabinets: Need to be set in order and made easier to find, to extract and return items.

NETHERLANDS PHILATELISTS OF CALIFORNIA SUPPORT WPL

Recently four members of the N.P. of C. had a work party at the library. Fred Van der Heyden, Albert Muller, Hans Kremer and Franklin Ennik came in just before noon to offer their help in making the library operate more efficiently. Two took on the difficult task of updating the file drawers holding our society and exhibition files. These files hold what organizational information we have on philatelic societies, concentrating mostly on the local groups. To quickly go to the drawer you want, the drawers need to have the first and last group names on the drawer which you normally would expect. However, they have expanded so much that even the first name was no longer correct on the first drawer! Fix that they did,

Two others worked on the book stacks putting the titles in order according to the authors name so they would match our electronic file data base and be located easily once you have the call number. Otherwise it is a real search to try and find a book even if you know exactly what its binding looks like. The number of new books added and the opening up of space by relocating journals meant this too was a real task just trying to keep track of where you are with the found digit numbers. There is a physical aspect as well in that this is like a gym workout in constantly lifting heavy books from one spot to another. They did get their exercise and that part of the library now is much easier to find materials just where they belong thanks to their effort.

Collectors that appreciate the value philatelic literature has also appreciate a smooth operating library and this group from the Netherlands Philatelic Society certainly help us do some of the normal operating functions that benefit all library users. Our personal thanks to them for taking the time to visit and help us keep the W.P.L. functioning!

Postmark Fraudster Jailed

We are indebted to our South Coast "deep throat" for keeping abreast of this case, and to Colin Smith for sending us a report of report of the judgment from a local paper

Robert George, from Romsey in Hampshire, manufactured cancelling devices and applied them to unused stamps in order to increase their value. It appears that he sold £30,000 worth to one collector, as well as sales over the internet and, no doubt, through auctions. In mitigation, his solicitor said "He has always struggled financially. Even when he has been unemployed he has never claimed benefits". We draw conclusions from this which differ from those he would have us wished to draw.

He was jailed for 21 months, so at least the court took his fraud seriously. It emerged that he had eight previous offences involving stamps, for attempting to obtain property by deception. We understand that his cancellation devices have been given to the Royal Postal Service.

A Visit to the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library By Ed Laveroni

I recently attended ROMPEX, the Rocky Mountain Stamp Show, and I had the honor of having a personal guide, Sergio Lugo, take me on a tour of the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library. Mr. Lugo is one of the founders of this library. He talked about how it was formed.

The RMPL started 19 years ago in the summer of 1991 with no money but a lot of interest at the club level. The first year they had only 5 members and from this nucleus they started the donation of money, philatelic books, stamp collections, and other library materials.

At first a building in a mall was loaned to them by a stamp club member for no charge except the paying of utilities. The library was staffed by unpaid volunteers and this is true even today. The library was forced to move several times, because the property was needed by the landlord for other ventures.

In 2 years they had collected \$35,000 from dues and donations. A site for the library was found. The sellers wanted \$135,000-\$145,000, and a club member who was in real estate was willing to handle the negotiations. The price was much more than what was in the treasury, but a loan from 2 Board Of Directors of \$40,000 and \$45,000 at 11%,

was still not enough to cover the total cost of the building. With the help of the negotiator and seller, a price was decided and the RMPL acquired the property.

They had a wreck of a building, but no money for repairs. The roof needed replacing, the building needed to be painted, shelves were needed, etc. Donated labor and supplies were the key to restoration of the building. Through donations and dues the building was paid off in 8 years. During this time, the BOD had organized a librarian fund, a building fund, a book fund etc with donated money.

In 2009, they had \$65,000 in the building fund. A two story building next door came on the market for \$350,000. The RMPL sent out a plea for donations, and 200 people donated \$295,000 to allow them to complete the deal. Sergio claims that when you have a building, volunteers materialize. But YOU HAVE TO ASK THEM. THEIR IDEAS MAY BE COUNTER TO YOURS, AND THEY MIGHT BE BETTER.

Today the RMLP is well staffed with volunteers. While I was there the RMPL was utilized by the public. When you enter through the door, the check out counter and the door to the librarian's office is on the right. The Librarian Ellengail Beuthel has been the librarian since the library first started. Tables and chairs are lined up next to a wall that has binders filled with stamps costing 5 cents to a dollar from all over the world. Another section has higher priced stamps, all very affordable. Everything is open and paid on an honor system. Behind the tables toward the back is an area for computers, a stamp microscope, printers for color and black and white, etc To the left of the tables are rows of books, and magazines. On the far left front is a room for the Railroad Society. Book shelves from floor to ceiling are lined with books about railroads. The next room is the office of a staffer. Toward the back is another room dedicated to Scandinavia and it is overflowing with books. In the very back is the Periodical Room with a rail shelf system loaded with periodicals. The shelves are stacked together due to space restrictions, but roll easily in order to reach the periodicals that are needed. The lighting is excellent. When the new building opens there will be all kinds of space.

The Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library online can be reached at www.rockymontainphilateliclibrary. The library is connected to the American Philatelic Research Library by INMAIC. There are now 4 libraries connected by this system. They include the RMPL, APRL, Collectors Club of New York, and Tuscon.

I see no reason why we can't do the same thing in the Bay Area. First we need a building that we own.

BOOK REVIEW

LOPP Catalogue by Chris Kulpinski. 64 pages, spiral bound or compact disc, Scottsdale AZ, 2010. \$30 post-paid in the USA, \$35 elsewhere, available from www.PolishPhilatelicLiterature.com, or Chris Kulpinski, 9350 E. Palm Tree Drive, Scottsdale AZ 85255.

This interesting publication will appeal to collectors of cinderella items, Poland postal history, and aerophilately. The English language catalog is the first one to update the information on these labels published in the 1966 *Sanabria's Air Post Catalogue*. It is based on the 2006 publication by Wladyslaw Lugowski and Jacek Kosmala on the "Fund for National Defense" that more than doubles the number of such labels recorded.

The version reviewed here is the CD of the work in PDFTM format. The LOPP was an organization established by the 1928 merger of two similar groups resulting in the "Liga Obrony Powietrznej i Przeciwgaziwej" or LOPP (League for Air Defense and Anti-Gas). The LOPP labels were a fundraising effort to promote Air Weeks and help provide revenue to support the air defense of Poland.



The labels were produced between 1924 and 1938 and sold by post offices for affixing to envelopes, but were not intended to be cancelled. The funds raised helped support the purchase of airplanes and the construction of airfields. The catalog listing begins with several forerunner labels issued by the League for Defense against Gas Attacks by Air. The labels are described in terms of denomination, dimensions, and perforation.

Section 2 presents LOPP labels in color with descriptions of size and perforation, and associated catalog numbers. Notes include the purposes of the labels like membership dues, construction of airport hangars, aeronautics week awareness, and related activities. Many labels are described as locals for cities such as Warsaw, Lublin, Krakow, Lodz, Poznan and others. Perforate, imperforate, and misperforated varieties are listed.

Some labels were used on balloon mail, some are identified as proofs or specimens, and some have perforated initials. Values are shown using a scale of relativity for the current year (2010) so that future values can be estimated. Values for labels on documents are considerably higher.

In section 3 of the catalog, those labels for membership dues are listed by town name to assist those who collect by location. Section 4 lists the so-called locals by cities, townships, and provinces. Section 5 is a geographical listing by purpose like construction of specific airports, purchase of airplanes, and acquisition of particular air defense equipment. Section 6 identifies labels issued for military naval purposes—a National Maritime Fund, and section 7 lists balloon labels and special handstamps and commemorative cancellations used with them.

The LOPP labels are interesting cinderellas used on mail and sold to raise funds for the aerial defense of Poland. They provide an interesting glimpse at peacetime efforts to protect the country and present an ominous interlude prior to World War II.

BOOK REVIEW

German Concentration Camps 1933-1945: History and Inmate Mail by Erik Lørdahl. Compact Disc in Word™ 2003, War and Philabooks Ltd. AS, 2008. ISBN 82-995588-0-8 from War and Philabooks Ltd. AS, Gydasv. 52, 1413 Tårnåsen, Norway.

This compact disc is an expanded and updated version of the 2000 edition, and the number of pages increased from 700 to 1300. The text is in the English language. To publish a hard print copy would be expensive and so the CD format makes the work much more affordable. Concentration camps were not for prisoners of war or refugees but rather for ethnic or political groups that do not benefit from fair trials. Although concentration camps have existed since before the turn of the 20th century, the most notorious are those created in Germany and its occupied territories under the Third Reich.

A short history of the concentration camps surveys five periods beginning in 1933 and lasting until the end of WW II in 1945. A timeline identifies significant events year by year. The organization of over seventy camps and key personnel are identified and a table provides location and opening and closing dates. A short bibliography completes this introductory chapter.

The next chapter describes the documents collected and shown, i.e. letters, the handling of mail, camp postal stationery, cachets and labels, stamps and cancellations, receipts, and telegrams among others. One of the larger files on the CD consists of collected articles about each camp, discussing camp history, censor marks, types of letters and stationery, and special cachets and labels. Tremendous detail is provided such as number of buildings in the camp, number of prisoners, cataloging of censor marks including illustrations, and even examples of forgeries.

Another file lists subcamps and the main ones they were associated with. Forgeries are dealt with in more detail here with separate files for many of the camps. Another file contains nine newsletters written by author Lørdahl after the first edition of his treatise, showing new discoveries.

One phenomenal file on this disc is a spreadsheet with over 10,000 documents (camp correspondence) listing the name of the prisoner, nationality, birth date, camp, and other details. This work is a very thorough compilation of data on the German concentration camps and prisoner mail. The black and white illustrations lend an immediacy (especially the letters and cards), and will help collectors to understand materials they assemble on concentration camp mail. The disc is a great resource for studying this aspect of World War II postal history.

BOOK REVIEW Latest 2010 Michel Catalogues Released

The Michel catalog is celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2010 and the German company's latest volumes are reviewed here.

All Michel catalogs are published in Germany in the 152 x 203mm (6 x 8 inch) softbound format with mostly color illustrations in the Europe series and black and white illustrations in the Overseas series. For each catalog, the page count, ISBN number and publisher's list price are provided. In all volumes, the text and descriptions are in German but the clear illustrations and format make it easy to use by anyone.

Michel Europa (Europe) Series

The Michel Europe catalogs are the standard reference used by European philatelists. The detailed chronological listings and easy to use format make them the popular choice for collectors seeking the most up to date information. Values in euros are provided for mint, used, on cover and FDC items. At the end of each country listing is a table that shows the value of each annual stamp program. In addition, a listing of all souvenir sheets is provided. The 2010 series has blue covers.

Michel 2010 Central Europe Catalogue (Europe Volume 1) by the Michel Catalog editors. Schwaneberger Verlag GMBH, Unterschleissheim, Germany, 2010. Softbound, 6x8 inch, 1,280 pp., color illus. ISBN 978-3-87858-890-0. The list price is 54 euros.

Volume 1 covers Central Europe, which includes Austria, Czechoslovakia, Czech Republic, Hungary, Lajtabanat (West Hungary), Liechtenstein, Slovakia, Switzerland and UN Geneva and UN Vienna. Issues up to the end of March 2010 are included. There are more than 14,000 color images and about 68,000 listed values.

Highlights for this edition incude a complete revision of the Western Hungary section that reflects the increased interest in Austrian and Hungarian issues and added illustrations and quantities printed for Swiss stamps.

Many price increases were noted, especially for issues from the Hungarian Occupation Zone, West Hungary and some early varieties from Switzerland and Liechtenstein.



The *Mittelamerika Katalog* has become Volume 1 of the Overseas series. The last edition, the 2008/2009 *Mittelamerika Katalog*, was Overseas Volume I, Part 2. Although subdivided differently in the series, the new edition covers the same countries, namely Belize, British Honduras, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Panama Canal Zone. Strangely, Michel continues to place Mexico, a North American country, into the Central America volume. The other countries are what comprise Central America. Belize is the former British Honduras.

New issues up to summer 2009 are included. There are more than 10,000 images and more than 50,000 values. While the Europe series has converted to color, all the images in this volume continue to be black and white.

Detailed information is provided for definitive and commemorative stamps, computer vended postage, variable-rate stamps, official stamps, postage due stamps, registration stamps, airmail stamps souvenir sheets and more.

Highlights for the 2010 edition include: revised used listings, reference lists of miniature sheets and definitive series, an update index and many improved illustrations.
