### **Summary of Board Actions**

#### THE FRIENDS OF THE WESTERN PHILATELIC LIBRARY, INC.

#### SUMMARY OF BOARD ACTIONS JULY TO SEPEMBER 2019

#### JULY 20, 2019:

**Election of New BOD Member: Ed Jarvis** asked **BayPhil Editor Bob Gordon** if he would be willing to join the **FWPL Board of Directors** as a member. Bob inquired about personal liability as a **Director**, and **Nestor Nunez** explained that the **Library's 501(c)3 Liability Insurance** coverage includes **Directors.** Bob said he feels it has been helpful for him to be connected to the Library as **Editor** of the **BayPhil** and agreed to take on the position if nominated. **Ed Jarvis** then moved to nominate **Bob Gordon** as an **At Large Director of the FWPL**, seconded by **Stu Leven.** The nomination passed unanimously.

**Funds and Fundraising: WESTPEX** will likely continue the yearly contribution to the **FWPL**. As an aside, it was pointed out that the new **Chairman Daryl Reiber** is a **Life Member**. **Dale** and **Edie Eggen** will be asked to help with "Crowd Sourcing". **Ed Jarvis** asked a neighbor, a licensed Real Estate Appraiser, to do an informal look at the **Library** building and reported it is valued at about \$1.5 million, with a loan value between \$1.5 and \$2 million. The building next door is for sale for \$1.9 million.

**Open House and Auction:** The **Open House** was held on **Saturday April 13, 2019** starting at 10:00 am with an **Auction** at 11:00 am. **Ken Lewetzow** and **Wally Jolliff** described and listed the lots. Thanks to **Wally Jolliff**, the listing of Auction Items are already on the **Website**. The Open House also featured a Book Sale as well as free Literature and Accessories. **Ed and Judy Jarvis** sponsored coffee, tea, and cookies for the event. **Roy Teixeira** organized the event, and his wife **Sigrid**, **Kristin Patterson**, **Eduardo Martino**, and **Dave Moore** also gave great help.

#### Policy Statement for Retention of American Philate-

*list*: After noting the availability of the complete run of this publication digitally, **Ed Jarvis** moved to keep only one unbound backup set of the *American Philatelist* (in addition to the bound set on the shelves), seconded by **Nestor Nunez**. Motion carried with one no vote. The other copies can be sold on eBay or given away.

Board Meetings of The Friends of Western Philatelic Library, Inc. are open to all.

#### **Safety Committee Report:**

a. Smoke Detectors and compliance with safety for the building: Roy Teixeira will get quotes for installing smoke detectors at the Library.
b. Lighting for the new "Board of Directors" meeting room (area under the deck – personal items need to be removed): As part of the cleanup, two large items, a defunct microfiche machine and oversize scale need to be removed from this area as well a boxes of personal material. Roy Teixeira obtained an estimate for \$1,326.88 to install New LED Lighting for the area. As funds are available from those raised by the Safety Committee, Ed Jarvis moved, seconded by Richard Clever, to go ahead with this project. Passed with a 4 to 1 vote.

#### **SEPTEMBER 14, 2019**:

Treasurer's Report: Nestor Nunez presented the Financial Statements through August 31, 2019, detailing the income and expenditures including Balance Sheets, Profit and Loss Statements, and Cash **Receipts**. A small amount of the **Restricted Funds for** Library Safety are still available. Nestor mentioned that this year's 2019 WESTPEX contribution of \$5,000 has been received. Other sources of Income include the April Open House, WESTPEX Book Sales, and the monthly eBay Sales. At the current "burn rate" of about \$3,500 a month, the currently available funds should last to about June, 2020. Additional funds are expected from various sources. The Federal Form 990 was filed electronically on September 13th. Ed Jarvis moved to accept the Treasurer's Report, seconded by Roy Teixeira, and passed unanimously.

**Funds and Fundraising: The San Francisco Pacific Philatelic Society** recently received a sizable bequest from the late **Jean Ostrander**, a longtime member. **Russ Samuels**, the current President, called a BOD Meeting of the **SFPPS** on August 31<sup>st</sup> and the Board voted to donate \$5,000 to the **FWPL**. Russ presented **Treasurer Nestor Nunez** with the check at this meeting. **Ed Jarvis** stressed that the Library cleanup needs to continue in order to attract more donations.

<u>Membership and Mailing</u>: In Richard Clever's absence, Ed Jarvis reported that there are no changes to the current 229 members, with 10 overseas. Two new Life Members are Vesma Grinfelds and Bob Gordon.

<u>County Welfare Exemption</u>: Although the Library did receive a refund and reduction in **Property Taxes**, no letter from San Mateo County has been received. **Nestor Nunez** noted however that the latest bill received reflects the exemption. The Library only pays about \$1,200 a year in Property Taxes, a huge reduction from the prior level.

<u>Website Update</u>: Webmaster Dave Moore has resigned and a new Webmaster is needed. David McNamee said all pertinent information should be saved in the 3-ring governance binders.



### Book Review by Alan Warren

Review of: Inspector Oldfield and the Black Hand Society

Co-author William Oldfield's great-grandfather, Frank Oldfield, served as a U.S. Post Office Inspector in the early 1900s. William, an archivist by trade, joined with noted story-telling author Victoria Bruce to recount the exciting story of the early years of the postal service's fighting organized crime.

The authors set the stage by telling how the Philadelphia and Baltimore printer William Goddard established the Constitutional Post in the 18<sup>th</sup> century to deliver newspapers. This delivery service was in opposition to the British Post that operated under the management of Benjamin Franklin who worked for the Crown in the colonies. The British Post charged twice as much. Franklin eventually fell out of favor with England and turned his sympathy toward the Patriots.

In 1775 the Continental Congress agreed to adopt Goddard's concept. However, Congress infuriated him by appointing Franklin the first Postmaster General. In need of a job, Goddard agreed to work for Franklin by surveying the countryside and establishing post offices to serve the public. He also took on the important responsibility of incarcerating criminals who stole from the mail carriers and post offices. This effort led to the Post Office Inspection Service.

The authors now jump ahead a century to the appointment in 1888 of Hamilton Oldfield as postmaster of Ellicott City, Maryland. Hamilton's son Frank was named Secure Clerk in the office where he met prominent businessmen and political figures. Later, Frank Oldfield was named sheriff of Howard County. Through his father's political connections Frank was appointed in 1899 to the position of U.S. Post Office Inspector.

During the early part of Oldfield's career, some Italian immigrants developed notoriety as Mafia elements operating in the United States, with ties back to organized crime in Sicily. Italian shop owners were forced to pay tribute to ringleaders who became known as the Black Hand Society (*La Mano Nera*), based on their signature cartoons left on threatening letters. Within the organization was the subsidiary Society of the Banana that operated in the greater Ohio area.

Oldfield entered into this underworld when an Italian fruit seller was murdered in Bellefontaine, Ohio, and two Black Hand letters were found in the victim's pockets. The local police were forced to turn the matter over to the postal service, who were responsible for crimes relating to the mails.

Oldfield called on friends of his in business and government and put together an amazing array of undercover agents, Pinkerton guards, translators, and interpreters as well as many mail carriers to gather information. One of the suspected leaders who sent large amounts of money back to Italy using postal money orders was believed to be the sender of the threatening letters to Italian businessmen. He bought large quantities of stamps at one post office in Marion, Ohio.

Oldfield told the clerks at the office to sell the suspect only 2¢ Washington definitives that had a secret mark, so they could be traced on envelopes. Postal agents also monitored the movements of suspected Society of the Banana members, and watched who attended clandestine meetings. After gathering sufficient evidence, Oldfield organized a series of raids on the homes of the suspects, beginning June 8, 1909.

Additional evidence obtained during the raids led to the capture and eventual conviction of eleven "fruit vendors" who claimed that the letters (written in code) were simply business communications. Oldfield was worried about getting convictions despite the overwhelming evidence. The defendants had sufficient tribute money to hire many high-powered lawyers. However, the jury convicted them and they served terms in federal prisons.

Shortly after the trial, Oldfield was besieged by offers of many wealthy businessmen to provide security and to investigate fraud. He left the postal service and earned much more money in the private sector. Unfortunately Frank Oldfield died in 1916 of stomach cancer at age 49.


For many years the Oldfield family stored trunks filled with Frank's belongings, although some were lost in a flood. Still, there were was one that contained some of the weapons retrieved during the raids on members of the Society of the Banana. The family papers together with government archives yielded this fascinating story. The book is well written and is exciting to read.

After finishing this book, author William Oldfield donated much of his great-grandfather's material to the Smithsonian National Postal Museum in Washington, D.C.

#### Safety Committee Report:

A quote for \$1,480 from California Energy Solutions (who recently installed the lighting for the new "Board of Directors" meeting room, the area under the deck in the back of the Library) was moved for acceptance by Nestor Nunez, seconded by Ed Jarvis and passed unanimously. After installation, Nestor will contact the broker regarding the fire insurance policy.

b. <u>Library Cleanup</u>: A nine-point memo to the Board was sent ahead of the meeting by **Roy Teixeira** who is managing the cleanup. With a few adjustments, **Bob Gordon** moved to adopt it, seconded by **Ed Jarvis**. The motion was adopted by a five to one vote.


Interlibrary Loan is available as well. For assistance, contact the Library at 650-306-9150 or by email at libry@att.net.
